The nature of creativity is always taking risks, satisfying an artist's curiosity by experimenting, exploring possibilities, and continually trying.

I am from Taiwan, trained in Chinese Opera dance and modern/contemporary dance, with training both in Taiwan and the US.

I am fascinated by the movements, strokes, and energy of Chinese calligraphy, and have tried to capture the essence Chinese calligraphy with this dance. Fabric – a key element of INK -- has been one of my favorite extensions of the body, one I often explore. I really appreciate INK dancers hop on this creative journey with me.

We also are creating a digital background to go with this dance, working with MTSU visiting professor Jianhua Yang from Qingdao, China. Digital image production is another experiment in this dance.

My next project is choreographing a dance to celebrate Chinese New Year at Schermerhorn Hall on February 7 at 7:30 PM with the Nashville Symphony Orchestra. The dance with recorded music will be repeated at the Chinese New Year Celebration at Musicians Corner, Centennial Park on Feb 10 at 1 PM.



I said yes to "try this" because I've been a fan of di Mossa since I moved here from Chicago in 2017 – so I am thrilled to collaborate finally! Before the invitation, I was experimenting with a solo to the theme from Asteroid City, and its' persistent ringing reminded me of an alarm going off in the morning. I thought this solo was a clear choice for the prompt, "Wake Up Call." As I continued exploring the movement with the prompt, I started unpeeling layers of what "Wake Up Call" could mean: awakening the body, discovering something might not be what it seems, and the exhaustion one might feel when awoken in the literal and figurative senses. I have enjoyed experimenting with the interplay of these layers, and I'm looking forward to expanding on the movement beyond tonight's performance.

Olivia Blanchard

Nashville based artist and Independent Curator



Olivia Blanchard is an artist and independent curator living and creating in Nashville Tennessee. She has a BFA from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and has exhibited in the South and Midwest United States.

She works with many different concepts within the realm of painting, and drawing. A common theme in her work is the idea of renewal by applying paint on a surface, whether a new coat or a textile inspired pattern.

At "Try This " you will be seeing mostly works on paper from Blanchard. This installation will be a curation of past figurative and decorative works, and one new piece that responds to the prompt "Fall to Pieces ". The piece is a Kintsugi-inspired collage of works on paper with gold leaf to encapsulate the concept behind the Japanese art of embracing damage through repairing pottery with lacquer and gold leaf. The piece itself represents the importance of acknowledging growth and grief and its importance in moving on from losing love.
